The Government of Japan has provided new equipment worth FJ\$5million to the Fiji Meteorological Service(FMS) for improvement of Disaster Risk Management in Fiji. H.E. Mr. Takuji Hanatani, Ambassador of Japan, will hand over the above-mentioned equipment to Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Hon. Parveen Kumar at a ceremony to be held at the FMS Head Office, at Korowai Road, AFL Estate in Nadi at 10:30 am, on Friday, 29 May 2015.

## Details for the Project for Improvement of Equipment for Disaster Risk Management

1. Basis for Implementing the Project

This Grant Aid scheme is aimed at promoting international co-operation in the field of disaster management by providing equipment for strengthening disaster management capabilities of recipient countries.

Japan recognises the hardship that Fiji has endured through natural disasters. The provision of technologically advanced meteorological equipment through this project will significantly raise Fiji's capacity to predict and monitor natural disasters such as floods, tsuramis, formation and path of cyclones as well as other weather anomalies. This would save more lives and aid the people of Fiji as well as Pacific Island Countries in preparing ahead for future natural disasters.
